Curriculum Plans for Parents

English

Poetry/Narrative

Using the text 'Cloud Busting' by Malorie Blackman, we will consider how poetry links with narrative to produce our own narrative poems.

The second half term topic:

Medieval Monarchs

RE

Why is the Torah so important to Jewish people?

We will make connections between Jewish beliefs about the Torah and how they use and treat it. We will weigh up the value of tradition, ritual, community, study and worship in the lives of Jews today and how far they are valuable to people who are not Jewish.

Humanities History – Medieval Monarchs

We will learn about the events leading up to and during the Battle of Hastings and the death of Thomas Becket, the qualities of a good Medieval King and important figures. We will study Henry VIII and why he initiated the Reformation and consider Elizabeth I's defeat of the Spanish Armada.

Reading: Throughout Key Stage 2, children should continue to read for at least 30 minutes on a daily basis. If you would like further information about how to support your child with their reading, please speak to the class teacher. Each child has a Reading Journal for you and

your child to record any reading completed at home.

Spelling: Each week children are set spelling patterns. Words should be practised frequently.

Maths: All children are expected to know their times tables and number facts. Regular practice at home will greatly help your child to become a more confident mathematician. In addition, exploring how **you** use maths on a day to day basis (telling the time, weighing or measuring objects etc.) and giving them the opportunity to apply their learning in real life contexts, would be extremely useful. Please speak to the class teacher if you would like some ideas about supporting your child's understanding of maths.

General support for other subjects: You can help your child in all subjects by looking at reference books from the library or using the internet to find out further information. Parents and carers can also be very valuable resources. If you can offer any knowledge, expertise or examples of artefacts related to our topics this term, please see your child's teacher.



We are always keen to have volunteer readers join our 'Lets Read Together' team. Is this something you may like to do for a few hours a week? Training is provided. If so, please contact Mrs Cronin via the school office.
